Join the nation for a two-minute silence to honour the service and sacrifice of the Second World War generation.

#### 3pm

Join in with the **Nation's Toast** by raising a glass, cheering and clapping on your doorsteps, and saying: "To those who gave so much, we thank you."

#### 9pm

Watch as **Her Majesty the Queen** addresses the nation on the BBC, at the exact time her father, King George VI, made his radio address to the nation in 1945 to announce victory in Europe.
