EASTER FUN IN THE JUNIOR SCHOOL




Issi and her Junior School friends have been busy making little Easter chicks and baskets filled with goodies to take home and enjoy. Lucky them!!

Excerpts from Freya and Rebecca's excellent work on the challenges of a youthful population in Gambia and the patanal ecosystem in South America. Well done on your inciteful and thought provoking research and writing.

Freya, Year 7

"Many issues are created by Gambia's youthful population, including the lack of money and resources which are required to send children to school, feed them sufficiently, and provide them with healthcare. Another problem is that significantly enlarged families can lead to over-crowded conditions, with some people having to share a room with up to 9 others. However, it is not just people who are impacted by the ever-growing population – the environment is too. In Gambia, as many can't afford electricity for their homes, trees are an extremely popular option instead. They are cut down before being used for food preparation and to create warmth. The more people who need food and heat, the more trees will be killed. It is predicted that within the next 50 years, the entirety of Gambia's forests could be gone."

"Due to land use changes and loss, flora and fauna are losing their habitats and being put under threat. Larger predators that could have survived are losing their prey and source of food and due to global warming and unpredictable weather, plants are unable to survive in those conditions. Global warming has caused more natural disasters, such as fires that have wreaked havoc on the habitats of animals and in 2020, a quarter of the Pantanal burned which is an area three times bigger than London"



CREATIVITY IN DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

SketchUp Outdoor Furniture Task -

Wooden: Consider an when you sit on it, the people either side of you are not in your vision which is good for people who don't want distraction. Or if you sit on the inside you will feel very close to your family and social. Lots of people can sit down on it. Does not use any materials that are bad for the environment. It would be awkward to be down on due to its circular shape.

Wooden and Metal: It has gaps in the metal and wood so that water can drain through and not build up. Not many people can sit on it and the seat on the other side of the plant looks a bit too small. The plant adds a bit of aesthetic to the bench. The angular shapes gives it a modern appearance and the hand rest prevents people from trying to lay down on it.

Concrete: Allows four people to sit down. Optimum resources very well by having only one leg which saves material. Table would be too thin for two people to sit at and leg space would also be compromised. Flat surface so water could sit on it and not run off. People may sit on it incorrectly by leaning against the side.



Concrete: Unique shape that looks interesting. It looks like 5 people should be able to sit down on it but it is unclear where you should actually sit down on it. If it rained then the water would sit on top of it because it is flat. It uses a lot of concrete compared to other benches which is not as good for the environment. The bench looks asymmetrical which could be considered modern.

Stone: This is my favorite design. The wood colour looks really nice. The lights underneath make it look really modern and contrast with the wood well. The plants add to the contrast in a really good way. People can sit down next to each other and it can fit a lot of people on without anyone's legs being crushed. The gaps in the wood will let water easily drain out. It is good for the environment since it uses wood. Apart from just being used as a bench it is also used to have plants look nice and just add to the aesthetic to the area. The wood would have to be treated often however to make sure it does not rot in the rain. There are no arm rests on the bench which means that people could lay on it.

Stone: The slopes do not really serve any purpose other than the looks. People might try and lie down on it which would be space. You cannot sit on the slopes either so only 2-3 people could sit on it. Water would not drain away off it and the backrest is far too low down to be comfortable. It does not use too much material however while appearing modern.

Stone: Designated seating spots for 3 people and it would be uncomfortable for people to lie down on which is good. Has a modern get modern look. Water could sit on it however making it wet. It looks a little bit too down to the ground. People of varying shapes and sizes may find it uncomfortable to sit on.

Metal: The table is just being placed at the table but then your legs would all just get pressed together. Water would be able to drain out of it easily and it would not remain too wet after rain. It could be created using recycled metal which is good for the environment. It is not as visually appealing compared to some of the other designs but it has better functionality. The table is rather small so eating could be a pain and since the table also is made out of pipes, cups would not be very stable on it.

WELCOME TO VICKY OUR NEW PARENT GOVERNOR


